Donald Dripps is a graduate of Northwestern University and a *magna cum laude* graduate of the University of Michigan Law School, where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review. Since clerking for Second Circuit Judge Amalya Kears, he has taught at the University of Illinois College of Law, and at the University of Minnesota Law School as the James Annenberg Levee Professor of Criminal Procedure. Mr. Dripps currently teaches at the University of San Diego School of Law, where he is now a Warren Distinguished Professor of Law. He is the author of *About Guilt and Innocence: The Origins, Development, and Future of Constitutional Criminal Procedure*, a casebook on *Criminal Procedure: Rights and Remedies in Police Investigations*, and the sole reviser and one of three authors for the last six editions of the casebook *Criminal Law and Procedure, Cases and Materials*. He has published book chapters with the Oxford University Press and the Cambridge University Press, and articles in, among other law reviews, the *California Law Review*, the *Columbia Law Review*, *Constitutional Commentary*, the *Duke Law Journal*, the *Journal of Legal Studies*, and the *Yale Law Journal*.
