WINTER SESSION CLASSES

There is a three credit max on all Winter Session classes.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Students will be registering concurrently for both Winter Session and Spring classes. However, if you register for a Winter Session course, the credits will be included in your total Spring credits. This means that full or part-time students who enroll in a Winter Session class will be disallowed from enrolling for the maximum of 16 or 11 credits respectively for the Spring. As a result, students who intend to enroll in the Winter Session and in addition, plan to take more than 11 credits if part-time, or 16 credits if full-time, for both the Winter Session and Spring semester combined, must email Jo Ann Maldonado the below Credit Overload Request at least 24 hours prior to registering. Once your request for a credit overload has been received, your maximum Spring credits will be adjusted to include the credits for the Winter Session.

Seats will be proportioned based on the number of students in each division (full-time day, part-time day and evening) and the maximum number of seats set for the course.

There are no waiting lists for Winter Session courses.

2018 WINTER SESSION COURSES

Executive Power and the Constitution

1 credit. Lecture

Professor Jonathan Hafetz

This course will examine the issue of executive power under the Constitution. The course will consider the legal framework for the exercise of executive power, its place within the Constitution's structure, and the constraints on it. Particular attention will be given to recent uses of executive power to address perceived national security and foreign policy challenges, including actions taken in the War on Terrorism and restrictions on immigration.

Evaluation will be by take-home exam.

Exoneration: Special Problems of Representing the Convicted Innocent (CRJU7415WS) 1 credit. Lecture.
Professors Michael Risinger and Lesley Risinger

The purpose of the course is to introduce students to the special legal and practical problems involved in developing and litigating a post-conviction case of factual innocence, most particularly the problems of fact investigation, the problems of dealing with waivers and defaults of claims and grounds at various stages in the proceedings, burdens of proof, the problems of coordination involved in schemes of state post-conviction remedies and federal habeas corpus, and the necessity of linking de hors-the-record exculpatory factual allegations to all possible legal claims (newly discovered evidence, actual innocence, and the “constitutional” claims of ineffective assistance of counsel and “Brady” violations).

The class will study two significant cases from 2002, in which Federal judges, asked to consider compelling claims of “actual innocence” on applications for writs of habeas corpus, believed they were not authorized under *Herrera v. Collins* to entertain the “freestanding” claim of actual innocence, but nevertheless wrote opinions that led eventually to relief for the petitioners, one of them on a renewed effort in state court. The class will then go on to study the implications of a more recent case that of Troy Davis, in which the Supreme Court remanded for an “actual innocence” hearing, and the District Court subsequently held explicitly for the first time that there is a “freestanding” claim of actual innocence under the United States Constitution. The class will compare the *Herrera* and *Davis* cases (in which the evidence of innocence was very weak) with the New York cases of *People v. Bermudez*, *People v. Rojas*, and *Rosario v. Ercole* (in which the evidence of innocence was very strong), and draw litigation lessons from the comparisons.

Evaluation will be by a 48 hour take-home exam (1/10 – 1/12).

Family Mediation (PRMD9216WS)

2 credits. Lecture/Skills (1 credit counts towards the 15 credit limitation on skills credits)

Professor Maurice Q. Robinson and Professor Elizabeth Vinhal

This highly interactive, interdisciplinary, comparative training (team-taught by a New York Mediator and New Jersey Family Law Attorney) is designed as an introductory survey to introduce and familiarize students with conflict management and effective advocacy skills for disputes that arise in the context of families, with emphasis on negotiating and mediating issues surrounding the dissolution of marriage, suits affecting the parent-child relationship, conservatorship, child support, parental rights and dividing of assets.

This course is designed to equip students with a basic understanding of the strategic judgment, skills and sensitivity needed to help parties build consensus on matters such as child custody, visitation, division of property, spousal support, and child education and support. Relevant emotional concerns, such as feelings of betrayal and loss are examined, along with techniques for advocating and addressing them in the collaborative forum.

Special considerations surrounding high-conflict families, domestic violence, spousal or child abuse, and relocation, as well as ethical issues related to power imbalances, court-annexed mediation, and mediator service are also examined.

Interspersed within discussion and role-plays are presentations of critical child development research, essential perspectives on the psychology and dynamics of divorce, the ways in which high levels of conflict and emotions in family law cases present special problems, and hidden opportunities for dispute resolution, as well as other practical information.

Course Structure

Family Law Mediation is an offering whose dual aims are to acquaint students with an introduction to this nuanced field of substantive law and to do so within an experiential learning model. The pedagogical approach will more realistically approximate the professional practice of law. The instructors will present material from the practitioner's perspective and provide practice-based examples that demonstrate the practical application of theory. Some students may have prior professional familiarity with family law or mediation, while others are new to the discipline. An equal welcome is extended to both groups.

HYBRID ONLINE/IN-PERSON COURSES

Cybersecurity Law, Policy and Compliance. This is an innovative hybrid online/in-person sequence of course modules that cover internet law and governance foundations; computer crimes; national security and critical information infrastructure; and cybersecurity investigation and compliance skills (not offered this year). Most of the course work is available online, supplemented with one-hour in-person meeting sessions. Each module takes up one-half semester (or one week of winter term) and is worth one credit, for a total of four available credits. The first module is required, after which you may take any (or none) of the remaining three modules, in any sequence that fits your schedule. Internet Law and Governance Foundations (INDL7330WS)

1 credit. Lecture/Online

Professor David Opderbeck

Internet Law and Governance Foundations. This is the required foundational course module. It asks the questions "what is cyberspace" and "what does it mean to govern in cyberspace?" We will examine questions relating to jurisdiction, enforcement, democratic control, speech, and commerce from the early days of the Internet to the present. This study raises the basic questions addressed throughout all four modules: what is the relationship between "liberty" and "security" in cyberspace?

Persuasion and Advocacy (PRMD8210WS)

2 credits. Skills.

In this highly participatory course, students will learn the art of persuasion in the context of the courtroom. Exercises and simulations will focus on the integration of storytelling and thematic development into the basic skills of direct examination, cross-examination, opening statements and closing arguments. By the end of the course students should be more able to argue and more likely to win – whether inside or outside the courtroom.

What's New?

Intellectual Property, Technology, and Justice (INTL9609AA)

AWR Seminar. 3 credits

Professor David Opderbeck

This seminar covers issues relating to intellectual property and technology law and social justice, including patents on essential medicines, copyright policy and cultural products, technology-enabled data collection and surveillance, Western intellectual property regimes and indigenous cultural appropriation, and related issues.

Introduction to the Deal (PRMD9278)

Skills. 3 credits (do not count toward skills cap)

Professor Harold Rolfe

The course revolves around three types of business transactions on which lawyers in the corporate departments of large and midsize law firms often work: capital-raising transactions (borrowing transactions and sales of debt and equity securities), acquisitions of tangible property and related contract rights, and acquisitions of entire businesses. For each type of transaction, the course's objectives are for students to gain an understanding of the following:

1. The tracks along which such a transaction will proceed and the milestones that will be encountered along each track.
2. The possible transaction structures that may be employed, the considerations entering into a decision regarding which structure to employ, and the issues that lawyers and their clients must address in the course of such a transaction.
3. Due diligence for such a transaction, in a general sense.
4. Documents delivered, and actions taken, at the closing of such a transaction, including closing opinions of counsel.

SCHEDULING OF SECOND YEAR REQUIREMENTS

- Second year full-time students must register for Business Associations, Financial Concepts for Lawyers (must be taken either before or at the same time as BA), and/or Evidence.
- Second year part-time students must register for Business Associations, Financial Concepts for Lawyers (must be taken either before or at the same time as BA), Professional Responsibility, and Criminal Law.

FIRST YEAR DAY SCHEDULE

First year full-time students should register for Introduction to Lawyering II, Civil Procedure II, Property, Criminal Law and Professional Responsibility.

FIRST YEAR WEEKEND SCHEDULE

First year weekend students should register for Introduction to Lawyering II, Civil Procedure II and Contracts.

SECOND YEAR EVENING SCHEDULE

Second year evening students should register for Constitutional Law II, Professional Responsibility, and Evidence.

THIRD YEAR EVENING SCHEDULE

Third year evening students should register for Evidence.

RESTRICTION OF EMPLOYMENT FOR FULL-TIME STUDENTS

The Law School requires that all full-time students who are registering for 12 or more credits are not employed more than 20 hours per week during the semester. In satisfaction of this requirement, all full-time students registering for at least 12 credits will need to "Accept" the following statement in order to enroll in classes:

"As a full-time student registering for 12 credits or more, I hereby certify that I will not work more than 20 hours in any week in which classes are in session."

PART-TIME CREDIT LOAD

Part-time students are restricted to registering for a maximum of 11 credits.

Spring Intersession (3-day course)

NITA DEPOSITION SKILLS PROGRAM

NITA Deposition Skills Program (PRMD9240EM)

1 credits. Skills.

Prerequisites: Persuasion and Advocacy and Evidence

The National Institute for Trial Advocacy (NITA) has developed a deposition program for practicing lawyers that is offered at numerous sites around the country. The program is being held at the Law School and has been scheduled for Friday, April 13 – Sunday, April 15, 2018. Prerequisites are Persuasion and Advocacy and Evidence. Students attend the same lectures as the CLE participants, but the Law School provides faculty to teach the students in their own sections during the breakaway sessions. There will be four sections and enrollment will be limited to 8 per section.

This course provides a strong framework for basic techniques of taking and defending depositions, and explores a variety of questioning methods. The result is that witnesses are encouraged to give expansive, exhaustive answers -- including other potential sources of information -- and that other potential avenues of escape are closed off. Students also learn to theory-test on subjects of importance to the case. Students receive supportive, helpful suggestions on how to improve performance, utilizing frequent repetitions in the learning-by-doing method to help master new techniques. A portion of the program is also devoted to ethical considerations in deposition settings and witness preparation.

The final schedule for the program will be circulated a few weeks before the course. Students should make sure that they are available on Friday from approximately 1:00pm – 6:00pm, Saturday from 9:00am to 6:00pm, and Sunday from 8:30am to 4:00pm. Please contact Professor Borgen with any questions about the schedule.

Seats will be proportioned based on the number of students in each division (full-time day, part-time day and evening) and the maximum number of seats set for the course.

Enrollment is limited to a max of 32 students. A wait list will be maintained for the NITA program (see #6, page 12 for instructions on how to add your name to the wait list).

Course is graded High Pass, Pass, Low Pass or Fail.

WEB REGISTRATION WORKSHEET

Check the registration schedule (see page 11) for your assigned web registration time slot. During the preregistration period, students are assigned times for registration. After November 10, registration is open to all students.

- 1) Make sure your computer is configured for on-line registration: Internet Explorer version 5.5 or higher is required: Cookies must be enabled; Pop-ups must be allowed.
- 2) Login to [LAWnet](#). Click on the Banner Self-Service button.
- 3) On the Main Menu, click on **Student and Financial Aid**, then on **Registration**. On the next menu screen, click on **Add or Drop Classes**. Click **Submit** to confirm Spring 2018 as your registration term.
- 4) Enter the CRNs of your classes in the boxes which appear on the **Add Classes Worksheet**. Press **Submit Changes** to submit your course requests. Your schedule will appear; check it for accuracy.
- 5) Changing your schedule: If you need to modify your schedule by dropping a course, pull down the options in the Action column for the course. Highlight **Drop on Web** – then press **Submit** to process the drop. If you don't press the **Submit** button after entering a drop action, you will remain in the course. To add a class, enter its CRN in the **Add Classes Worksheet** box. Press **Submit** to record your add request.
- 6) How to wait list: If a course is closed and a wait list is available, a message will appear, click the drop down box and choose **Add Name to Wait List** and be sure to then click **Submit Changes**.

To look up classes: From the **Registration Menu**, click on **Look Up Classes**. Select **Spring 2018** from the Term menu. Using the pull-down option, select the subject if you are seeking courses in a specific discipline. Also enter the course number if you are looking for sections of a specific course. You can also search by campus, course level, instructor, meeting day(s) and times.

OUTSTANDING TUITION BALANCE/FINANCIAL HOLDS

It is your responsibility to clear any unpaid balance with the Bursar's Office prior to registering through Banner Self-Service. Financial holds are automatically placed on your account regardless of the amount due. In addition, all monies must be received prior to the date of your registration, regardless of the source from which the tuition is being paid. If you have a current balance, you will be automatically blocked from registering for courses and will be referred to the Bursar's Office. This will result in having to restart the registration process (if cleared by the Bursar to register) and will reduce your chances of enrolling in your desired courses.

OTHER HOLDS

There are several types of holds which could affect your registration status, namely: bursar, academic, transcript, health services and financial aid. Prior to registration, it is recommended that you go online to check if you have any holds on your account. If one does exist, you should contact the appropriate department to resolve the hold. If you have any questions about a financial hold, please contact the Bursar's Office at 973-642-8385.

COURSE REGISTRATION PROCEDURES*

1. All students registering for full-year courses are required to remain with the same professor during both semesters.
2. All students must register for required courses in the semester in which they are scheduled to be taken within the students' division, unless they receive written permission from the Associate Dean for Academics to defer a requirement.
3. Full-time students must register for the majority of their courses within their division unless prior written approval is received from the Associate Dean for Academics. Full-time students may register for electives offered in the evening, but do not receive priority for them.
4. Course sections beginning with the letters "A-L" are day courses and sections with the letters "M-Z" are evening courses. Course sections beginning with the letter "E" are available to both day and evening students. **Not all courses offered before 6:05pm are available to evening students.** Evening students should refer to the course section to determine eligibility for enrolling in any course scheduled during the day.
5. Course sections beginning with the letter "Z" are for MSJ students only.

***NOTE:** The Law School schedules courses according to the availability of facilities and instructors. Not all courses and seminars are offered each year. Several courses may be offered only in alternate years. The Law School reserves the right to add, delete, or to change any course, or the credit for any course, at any time. Some courses, and all seminars, skills offerings and clinical programs have limited enrollments. As in other law schools, Seton Hall Law School cannot assure every student the opportunity to take every desired course.

PASS/D OR FAIL OPTION POLICY

Once during a student's last four semesters, he or she may opt to take an elective course (excluding clinics) on a Pass/ D or Fail option. It is entirely up to the professor teaching the course whether he or she chooses to make this option available, and if so, may only be up to a maximum of 20% of the class. The Director of Academic Services will determine if more students request the Pass/D or Fail option than there are seats, which students are permitted to take any course Pass/D or Fail. No student may take an AWR course using this option if he or she needs AWR certification for the graduation requirement. Courses that are offered with the option of Pass/D or Fail are noted in the schedule of classes enclosed in this handbook. **A course that is only offered on a Pass/D or Fail basis shall not count as the "one elective" that may be taken on a Pass/D or Fail basis.** To apply to take a course that is being offered with this option, you must submit the [Pass/D or Fail Option Form for Elective Courses](#).

EXAMINATIONS

Final examinations will not be scheduled until after the Drop/Add period. Students who have an exam conflict can then request a rescheduling of an examination based on the Law School's Conflict Policy. The exam schedule will be posted on our website by the week of February 19th.

CREDIT LOAD

A full-time student is required to register for a minimum of 12 credits with a maximum of 16 credits. This limitation applies to joint degree candidates as well. A part-time day or evening student is required to register for a minimum of eight credits with a maximum of 11 credits. No student on probation will be permitted to register for courses in excess of the maximum set forth in his/her letter of probation.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT

All students must meet the law school's residency requirements in order to be certified for graduation. A full-time student must be in residence for at least six semesters with a minimum of 10 credits each semester and a part-time student must be in residence for at least eight semesters with a minimum of eight credits each semester. Any student who has changed divisions or is seeking to graduate a semester early must check with the Director of Academic Services in order to insure compliance with this requirement.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS/PREREQUISITES

Students are responsible for checking course pre/co-requisites.

ADVISORS

There will be a number of faculty members and administrators who are available for advisement during registration. Please feel free to [contact any advisor](#) on the list for an appointment to discuss your schedule.

DROP/ADD PROCEDURES

The Drop/Add period consists of the first week of classes — Thursday, January 18 – Wednesday, January 25. **No student will be permitted to drop/add after the first week of classes, nor will any student receive academic credit that is not officially registered by, Wednesday, January 24.**

WAIT LISTS

Wait lists will not be available for any courses (except for the NITA program). If a course is closed at the time of your registration, it is highly recommended that you should periodically check online for seat availability during Open Registration (11/11 – 1/24).

COURSE WITHDRAWAL

A student is permitted to withdraw from a course up until the day of the scheduled examination, or if self-scheduled, the last day of examinations. In the case of a seminar, a student may withdraw up to the day in which the paper is due. However, no student may attempt more than 95 credits of academic work, including retaken courses. A course from which a student withdraws with the approval of the Associate Dean for Academics does not count as an attempted course. Notwithstanding the above, any student who is involuntarily withdrawn or who withdraws, with or without approval, from more than 20 credits will be automatically dismissed. A student withdrawing from any course, including externships, journals, clinics, moot court or Independent Research will receive a grade of "WD" (Withdrawal).

COURSE CANCELLATIONS

Students will be notified by phone or e-mail in the event a course is cancelled.

MAY 2018 DEGREE APPLICATION

All LLM, JD, and MSJ candidates who intend to complete degree requirements after the Spring 2018 semester, must file the online [Graduation Application](#) form with the Office of Enrolment Services. Applications must be received by Wednesday, January 24. **Failure to file this application may result in the student's graduation date being the next available date after the succeeding semester.**

CREDIT FOR JOURNALS

Members/editors should register for journal credit based on their below journal status.

- New journal members register for a one credit member for both the fall and spring semesters.
- Continuing journal members (second year on journal) register for zero member credits for the fall semester (members must register for the journal even though it's for zero credits) and for a one credit member for the spring semester for a total of three credits over four semesters.
- Editors (students on the editorial board only) register for a one credit editor for the fall semester and for a two credit editor for the spring semester for a total of five credits over four semesters.

INDEPENDENT RESEARCH - Minimum 3.00 GPA

Students interested in registering for Independent Research must complete the online [Independent Research Approval Form](#) and obtain the appropriate signatures of their faculty advisor and the Independent Research Committee members. Upon submission of the approval form, students will be registered for the course, but in no case will any student be registered later than the end of the Drop/Add period (first week of the semester). It is the student's responsibility to insure that the completed form is returned to the Office of Enrollment Services before the end of the Drop/Add period.

THE LEGAL PRACTICE CURRICULUM

The Legal Practice Curriculum offers students rigorous training in the skills needed to practice law. The classes utilize simulation exercises where students are required to engage in real lawyering tasks such as advocating for a client at trial, drafting a legal brief or contract, and mediating a dispute. These courses have limited enrollment (generally 8-12 students per section), thereby allowing significant interaction with and feedback from faculty. Many of these classes are taught by adjunct professors who are experts in the area. For example, federal judges and experienced trial lawyers teach many of the litigation skills courses.

REQUIRED COURSES

Each law student is required to take three legal practice courses prior to graduation.

1. Introduction to Lawyering (LAW5050-51) (formerly Legal Research and Writing - LAW6003-04)
2. Appellate Advocacy (MTCT7151)
3. Persuasion and Advocacy (PRMD8210)

Introduction to Lawyering

The Introduction to Lawyering course will introduce students to the fundamental skills employed by lawyers across various practice areas and will develop within students the habits of thoughtful, reflective, and ethical professional practice. Lawyering sections will be small and students will often work collaboratively in teams on projects; thus providing a collegial intimate academic setting.

Appellate Advocacy

Appellate Advocacy is a two credit required course that meets once a week in sections of no more than 16 students. Each section will be taught by an instructor with the assistance of a member of the Moot Court Board, who will focus on brief writing skills, advocacy strategy and oral argument skills.

Students receive a letter grade for the course, based upon completion of an appellate brief, a final round of oral argument, and participation in class and conferences. Students will prepare drafts and a final brief on a one-issue moot court problem, present several practice rounds of oral argument and one graded round, and meet in individual conferences with the instructor.

Students customarily register for Appellate Advocacy in the first semester of the second year (day division), second semester of the second year (part-time day division) or in the first semester of the third year (evening division). New law journal members are advised to wait until Spring semester to register for Appellate Advocacy. This sequence allows the maximum opportunity for students to participate in the Gressman Competition, the Interscholastic Moot Court Board and the Appellate Advocacy Moot Court Board. This traditional sequence also affords students maximum flexibility in completing the AWR requirement, course selection, clinical participation, and other academic/co-curricular activities.

Persuasion and Advocacy

Persuasion and Advocacy teaches students the art of persuasion. While the course uses the context of a courtroom, the skills developed are applicable across the spectrum of legal work, whether in corporate negotiations, zoning board presentations, or appellate arguments. The exercises and simulations focus on the integration of storytelling and thematic development into the basic skills of direct examination, cross-examination, opening statements, and closing arguments. This is a highly participatory course, and students will be asked to participate in drills and simulations in every class.

In addition to the sections of Persuasion and Advocacy offered in the Spring 2018, multiple sections of the course will also be offered in the 2018 Winter Session for those students who are interested in taking the course in an accelerated full-day setting.

ADVANCED LEGAL PRACTICE COURSES

The law school offers a number of advanced legal practice courses where students can further exercise and improve their lawyering skills in specialized areas such as litigation, alternative dispute resolution, and transactional practice. For the Spring 2018 semester, the following advanced legal practice courses will be offered:

ADDITIONAL LEGAL PRACTICE OFFERINGS

Eugene Gressman Appellate Moot Court Competition

The Eugene Gressman Moot Court Competition is an elective course for second year day, third year day, and third and fourth year evening students who have received a passing grade in Appellate Advocacy or are taking Appellate Advocacy as a co-requisite. It is a one credit class, graded on a **Pass/D or Fail** basis. Participants must be available on all competition dates (for the Compulsory Round students will be assigned a Saturday or Sunday and religious observance will be accommodated). Course credit is granted upon submission of an acceptable brief and participation in all rounds until eliminated. **Participants will meet as a class once during the entire semester; it is scheduled for Friday, January 19, at 12:00 p.m., in the Auditorium. Attendance is mandatory.**

All participants in the Gressman Competition receive the same problem written by the Appellate Advocacy Moot Court Director. The problem addresses a current legal issue not yet resolved by the United States Supreme Court. During the one and only class meeting, the participants are assigned to submit a brief on behalf of either the petitioners or respondents. **Participants will not be competing in teams.** Students who advance at least to the semifinal round may be invited to join the Interscholastic Moot Court Program.

Please note that participation in the Gressman Competition is highly recommended to students interested in applying for a position on the Appellate Advocacy Moot Court Board.

EXTERNSHIPS

Students can develop their practical skills in real lawyering contexts through the Externship Program. Seton Hall has a broad range of Externship placements in nearly 200 not-for-profit and governmental organizations, with judges of approved courts, and with select entertainment organizations. The Externship Program provides students the opportunity to obtain academic credit for interning with approved organizations, provided all requirements are met.

ADVANCED WRITING REQUIREMENT

All students are required to fulfill a substantial writing requirement for graduation. The following courses offered will fulfill this requirement. The courses listed are the only courses offered during the Spring 2018 semester which will fulfill the Advanced Writing Requirement.

NOTE: Students who enroll in the above courses must meet AWR standards even if they do not need AWR certification.

For all papers which are intended to satisfy the Advanced Writing Requirement, the professor must agree that the topic is appropriate for advanced legal writing credit. After completion of the paper, the professor must certify to the Director of Academic Services that the paper satisfies the Advanced Writing Requirement. At the option of the professor, this certification may be based on revisions which are made after the student has received a final grade in the seminar. Revisions made after the conclusion of the seminar shall not result in any change in the final grade.

The following also qualify for the Advanced Writing Requirement:

Students may receive [AWR certification](#) for comments written for any of the three journals: Law Review, Legislative Journal and Circuit Review. The faculty member supervising the comment must certify that the comment satisfies the AWR requirement as specified on our website.

CURRICULUM PLANNING

Persuasion and Advocacy is a prerequisite for the advanced litigation and transactional legal practice courses, and students who are interested in further developing their skills for legal practice should take Persuasion and Advocacy early enough in their law school career to allow room for these advanced courses. To enroll in Advanced Civil Practice and Advanced Criminal Practice, students must also have completed Evidence course. Advanced Civil Practice or Advanced Criminal Practice is a prerequisite for either Trial of a Civil Matter or Trial of a Criminal Case.

To enroll in most clinical courses, students must first complete courses in Persuasion and Advocacy, Evidence, and Professional Responsibility.

Some legal practice courses are only offered once per year, while others may be offered only in alternating years. Thus, students should plan ahead for legal practice courses. In addition, other advanced legal practice courses may be added to the curriculum in future semesters.

LIMIT ON LEGAL PRACTICE AND SELF-DIRECTED WORK CREDITS

No more than 15 credits of legal practice and self-directed work credits shall count towards graduation. This would include legal practice courses (excluding Persuasion and Advocacy), externships, moot court (excluding Appellate Advocacy), Independent Research, and clinics (non-classroom component only). Journal credits are not included in the limitation.

EQUIVALENCY COURSES

There are a number of courses which have substantial overlap in course coverage, and as a result, not all may be counted towards degree requirements.

CLASS ATTENDANCE POLICY

The Law School has a mandatory Class Attendance Policy which calls for students to attend a minimum of 75% of class sessions in a course or be administratively withdrawn from the course. No excused absences are permitted. An absence for any reason, including late registration, counts towards the maximum of 25% absences allowed.
