It has been an honor to serve as the Seton Hall Law Student Bar Association President this year. I am proud, that in a few moments, my final act will be to introduce our 2024 commencement speaker: United States District Court Judge for the District of New Jersey, the Honorable Michael A. Shipp.

I first met Judge Shipp in the fall semester of my 2L year in his Advanced Negotiations class. And I. was. intimidated... I had heard other students sing his praises and his reputation in the legal community certainly preceded him.

Judge Shipp was appointed to be a district court judge in 2012, after serving as a magistrate judge for five years. Prior to the federal bench, Judge Shipp's commitment to public service led him to be the Assistant Attorney General in-charge-of New Jersey's Consumer Protection Practice Group and later to be named Counsel to the Attorney General.

On the other side of the podium in the DeCotiis Moot Court Room, I had all of two semesters of law school experience. I didn't know it at the time, but as it turns out, Judge Shipp and I have learned the very same lesson.
