LAW SCHOOL AND UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATIVE POSITIONS

- **Dean** (2015-present) – Oversee all operations of the Law School campus. Serve as primary external “face” of the Law School including media relations, fund-raising, alumni relations, as well as general liaison with such constituencies as state and federal, bench, bar, and government leaders. Finished years two and three of deanship \$1 Million better than budget; will balance budget in 2020, two years ahead of five-year budget model. Hired Law School's first Assistant Dean of Diversity and Inclusion who is a direct report to me. Lead strategic planning process to obtain Top 50 US News Rank by 2025. Serve as University president's delegate on task force to obtain all accreditations necessary to transition Seton Hall Medical School to Hackensack-Meridian.

- ***Associate Dean for Academic Advancement*** (2007-10, 2012-2015)—Planned, created and oversaw Seton Hall Law Division of Online Learning, which by FY18 comprised 24% of Law School's revenue, and offers online graduate courses and graduate certificates in health and life sciences compliance, financial services compliance, privacy, and cybersecurity. Oversaw development and expansion of compliance training offerings, including certificate program in life sciences, which currently occurs twice annually in Newark and EU and once annually in LATAM, Asia and the Middle East. Oversaw Corporate and Foundation Relations, which involved working with faculty to identify, prepare and submit grants to foundations and government entities. Worked with dean to develop and steward corporate donors.

- ***Founder, Seton Hall Law’s Center for Health & Pharmaceutical Law & Policy***—Seton Hall University School of Law is routinely ranked by U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT as one of the top health law programs in the country. The Center, which in 2009 absorbed the former Health Law & Policy Program, comprises all of the Law School’s health-related activities, including three degree programs; a health law concentration with a compliance track; and an externship program, including a semester in D.C. opportunity. The Center also houses the Healthcare Compliance Certification Program (HCCP). The Center hosts distinguished scholars and distinguished practitioners as well as fora, symposia and other educational programs, and produces a variety of publications, including White Papers on healthcare policy. The Center is supported by foundation and corporate contributions and revenue from the HCCP. It comprises five full-time tenured faculty, three administrative staff and two full-time faculty researchers. One faculty member is fully supported by an endowed chair obtained by the Center.
- ***Founder, Seton Hall Law’s Health Law & Policy Program (HeLPP)***—HeLPP was the predecessor of the Center. It was self-supporting from its inception through multiple corporate grants and successful development of alternative revenue streams, including degree and certificate programs. HeLPP sponsored the Merck Visiting Scholar Program, which hosted a nationally prominent health or pharmaceutical law scholar at the Law School each semester; the Health Issues Colloquium, which hosted a legal, medical or economic academic for a lecture each semester; and an Annual Health Law Symposium published in the Seton Hall Law Review.
- ***Founder, Seton Hall Law’s Health Care Compliance Certification Program for Pharmaceutical and Medical Device Professionals***—The Healthcare Compliance Certification Program (HCCP) is a multi-day educational program for compliance professionals and lawyers interested in enforcement of laws, regulations, and other guidance applicable to the pharmaceutical and medical device (life sciences) industries. HCCP currently occurs multiple times per year in Newark, California, Paris, Prague and Singapore. Some 1700 participants from 35 countries and 230 entities have obtained a certificate in the Newark offering. The Program addresses issues faced by the life sciences industry in complying with standards such as the OIG’s Compliance Program Guidance for Pharmaceutical Manufacturers, the PhRMA Code, the AdvaMed Revised Code of Ethics, the European Federation of Pharmaceutical Industries and Associations and Eucomed Codes, the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, the OECD Convention against Bribery, and the UK Bribery Act.
- ***Director, Seton Hall Law’s Health Law Graduate Programs***—Created and obtained ABA acquiescence in 1997 for an LL.M. in health law and an M.S.J in health, science and technology law.
